This letter should include a request to not impose restrictions to local government on how this service and the included checks are provided and by whom. Government has since announced its intention to continue the mandation of the universal 5 health visiting checks which are offered between pregnancy and up to age 2½ years, as set out in Healthy Child Programme (0 to 5).
