- 2.6 Members noted that there had been successful 'Prevention Matters' day with district & borough councils. A meeting with multiagency teams is needed. It was also noted that each district and borough had its own health plan and the County Council continued supporting local authorities to complete plans for publication.
- 2.7 The Committee were pleased to note there would be more work carried out in relation to mental health this year.
- 2.8 Members were satisfied with the written evidence provided to recommendation 2.6.
- 2.9 It was noted that extensive discussion on schools on obesity plans had taken place. The solution is for each school to focus on training teachers and governors how to reduced stress to improve health rather than a reliance on nurses.
- 2.10 Members noted it was the ambition that every school had a mental health lead and Public Health was happy to continue working to achieve this.
- 2.11 The ISSC (HSC) requests that the executive members and chief officers for Public Health and Children's Services raise the issue an overarching health policy and framework for schools with central government. Further, that the Association of Directors of Public Health also make representation to central government."
