Highlights from the dashboards

Quarters 1-2, 2017/18

Q.1-2: In a nutshell

- There have been some notable improvements in outcomes and how we compare with our peer group of similar local authorities, as well as some areas in which outcomes themselves or our peer group ranking has worsened.
- Inter-district inequalities have increased for some indicators and reduced for others.
- New data have not yet been released for all of the indicators.

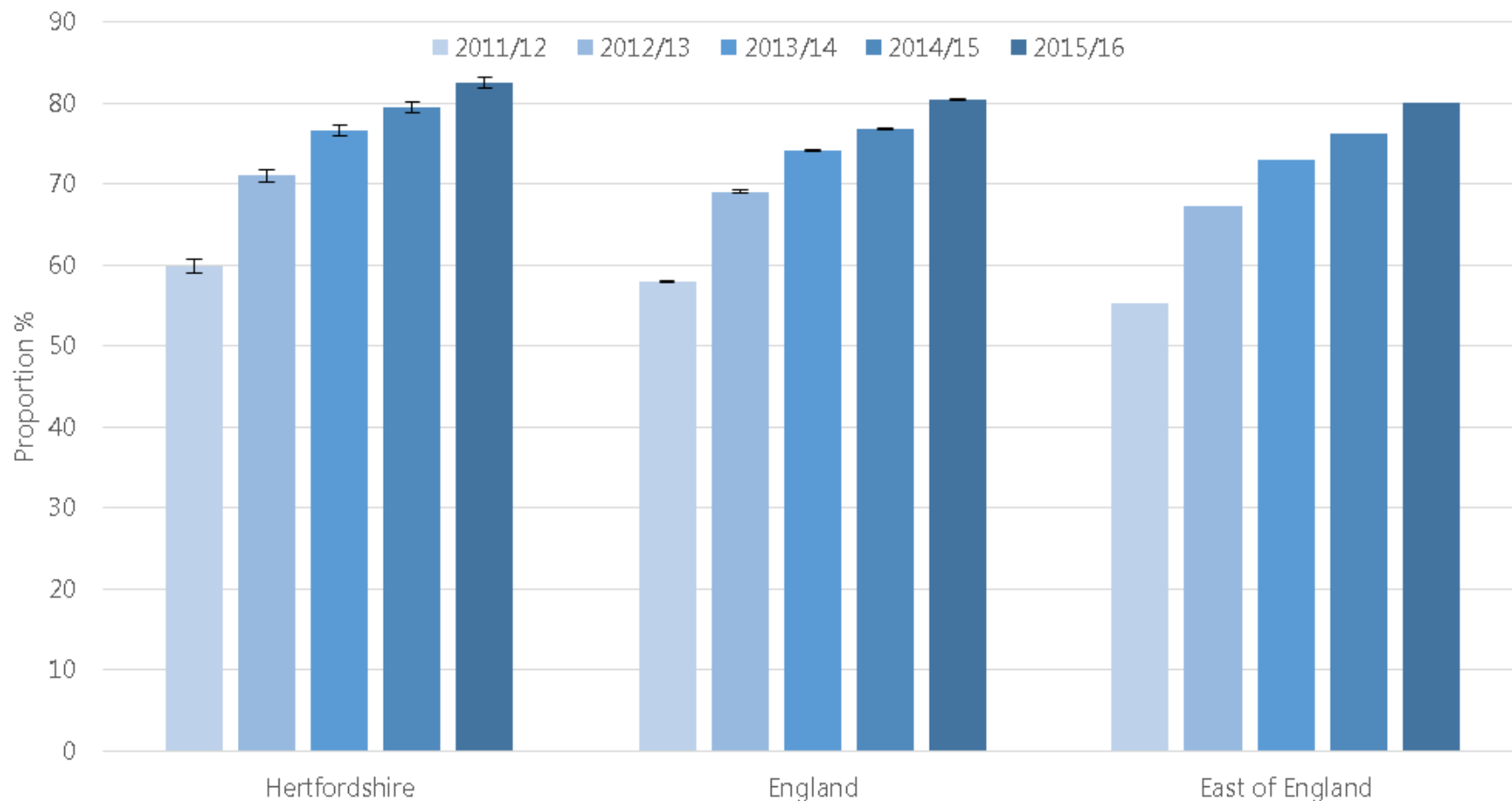

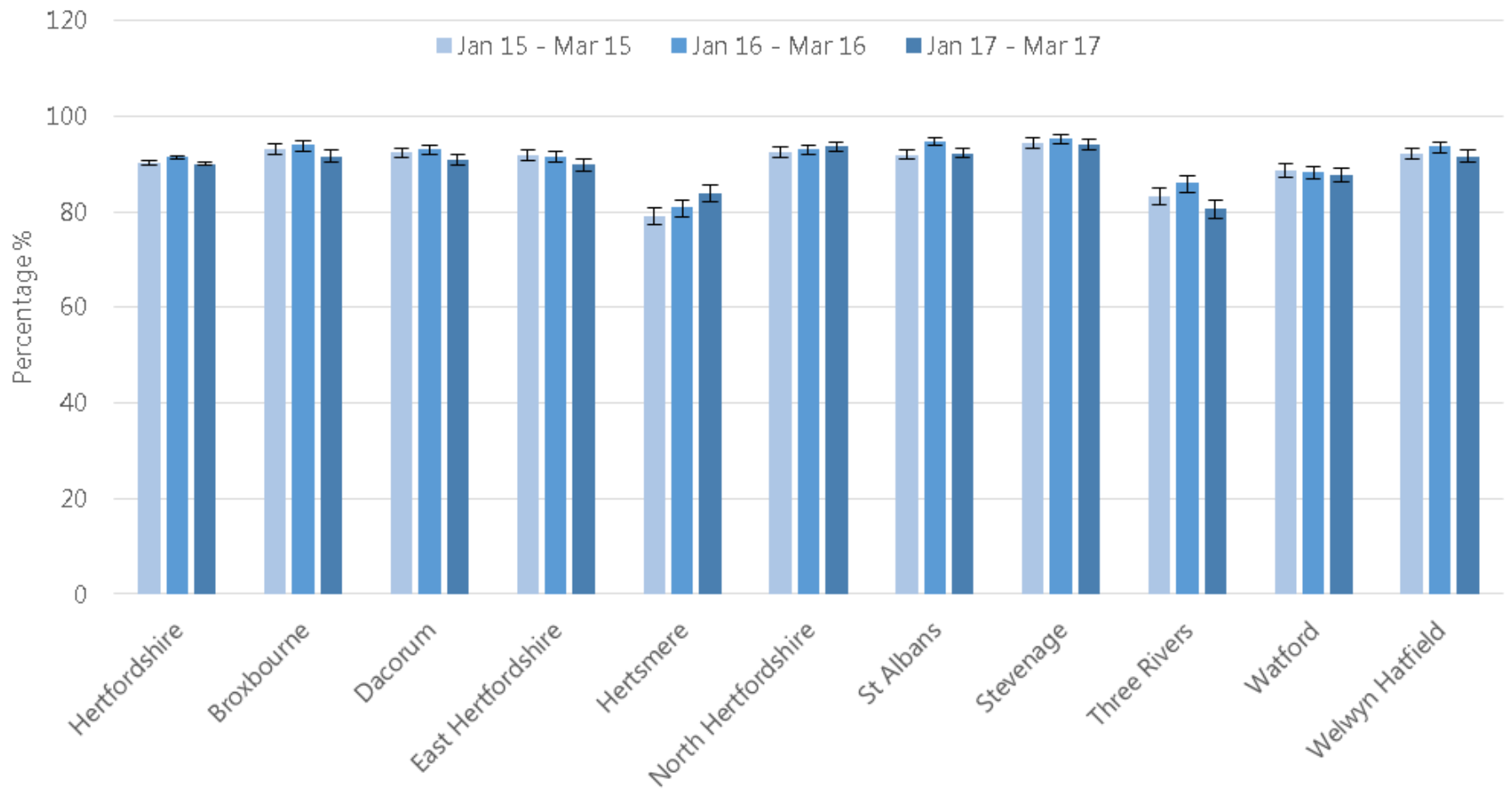
The percentage of Year 1 pupils achieving the expected level in the phonics screening check, Persons, 6 yrs

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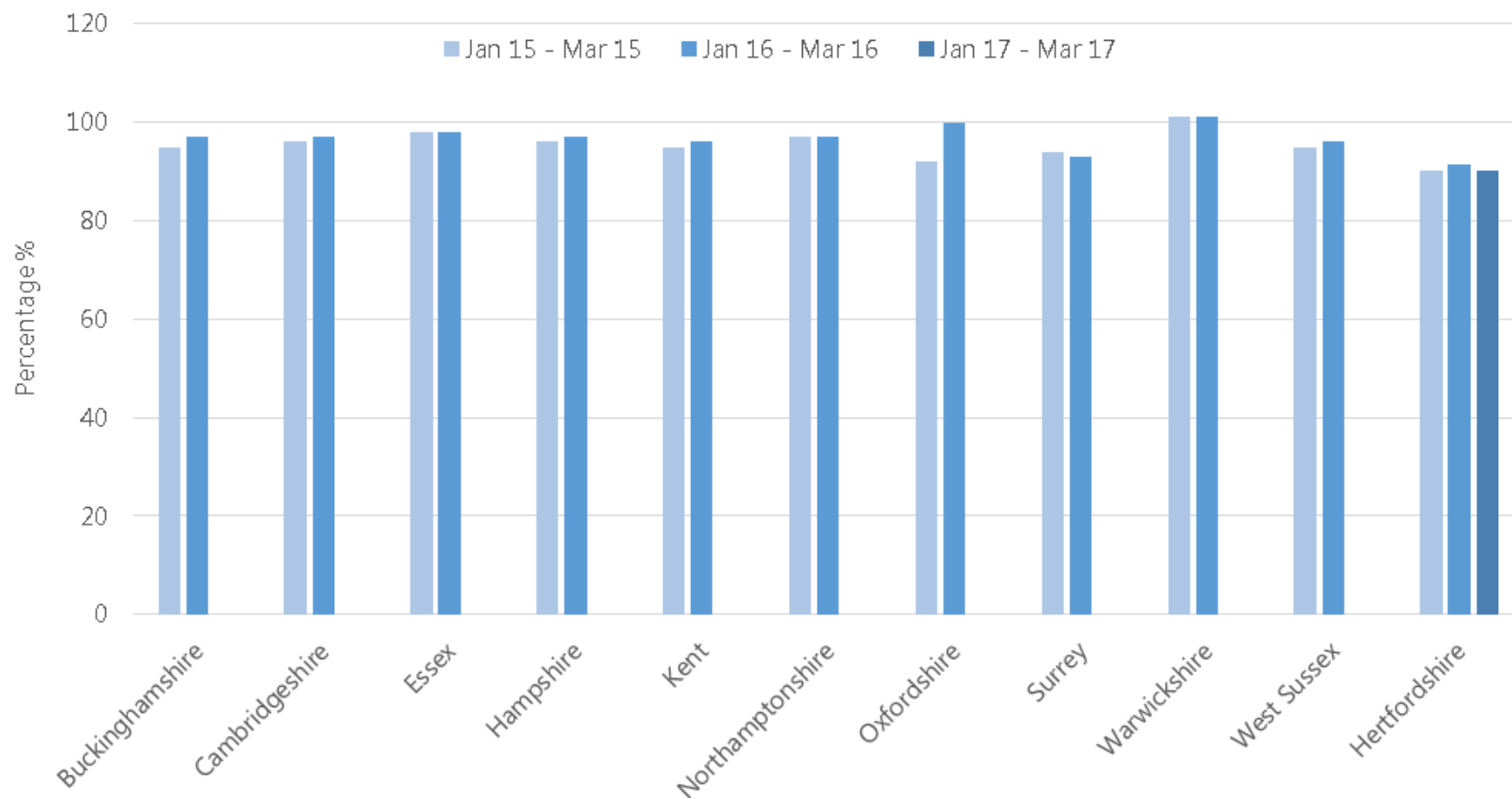
% take up of free early education entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds, Persons, 3 and 4

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% take up of free early education entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds, Persons, 3 and 4



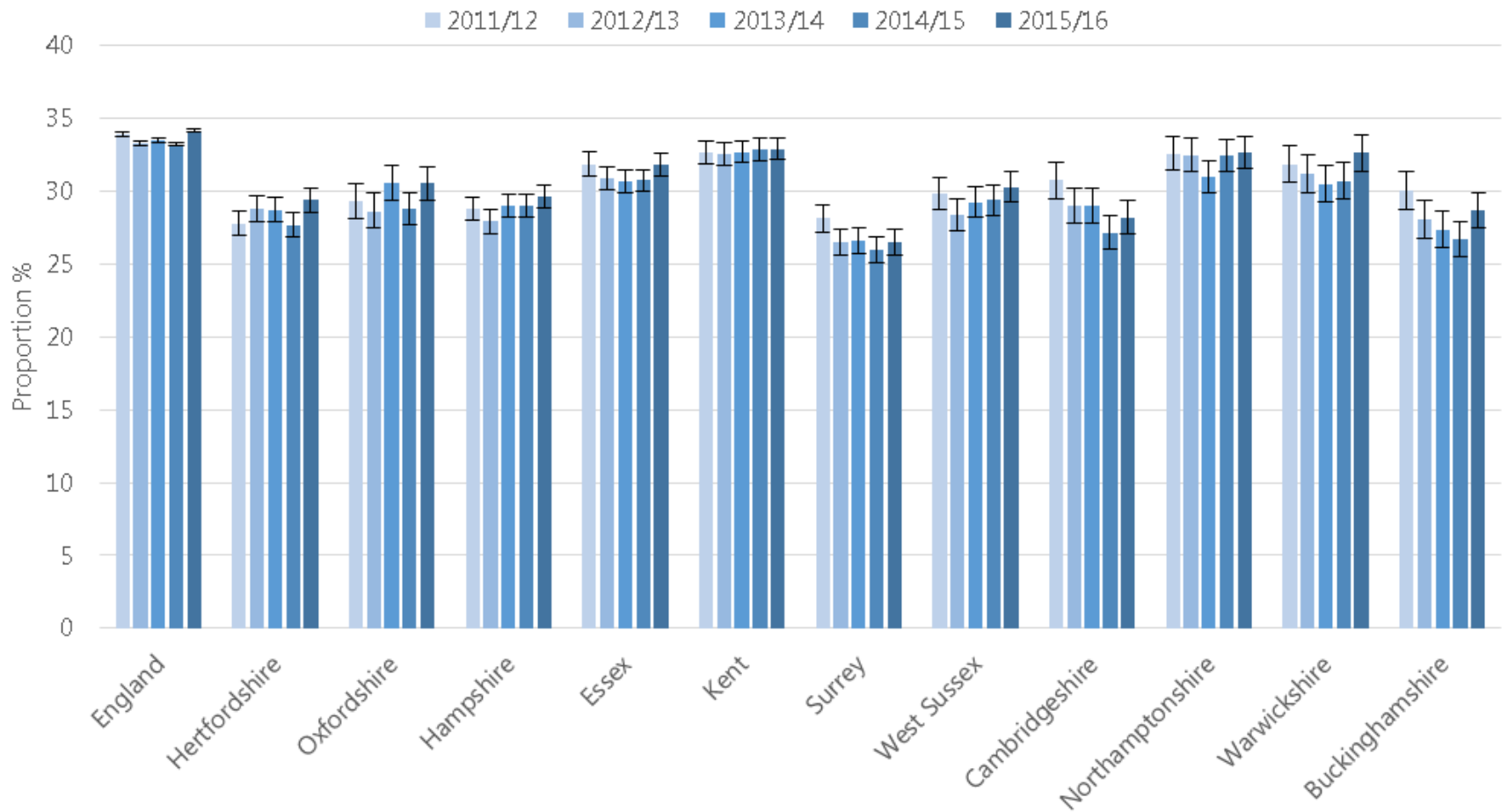

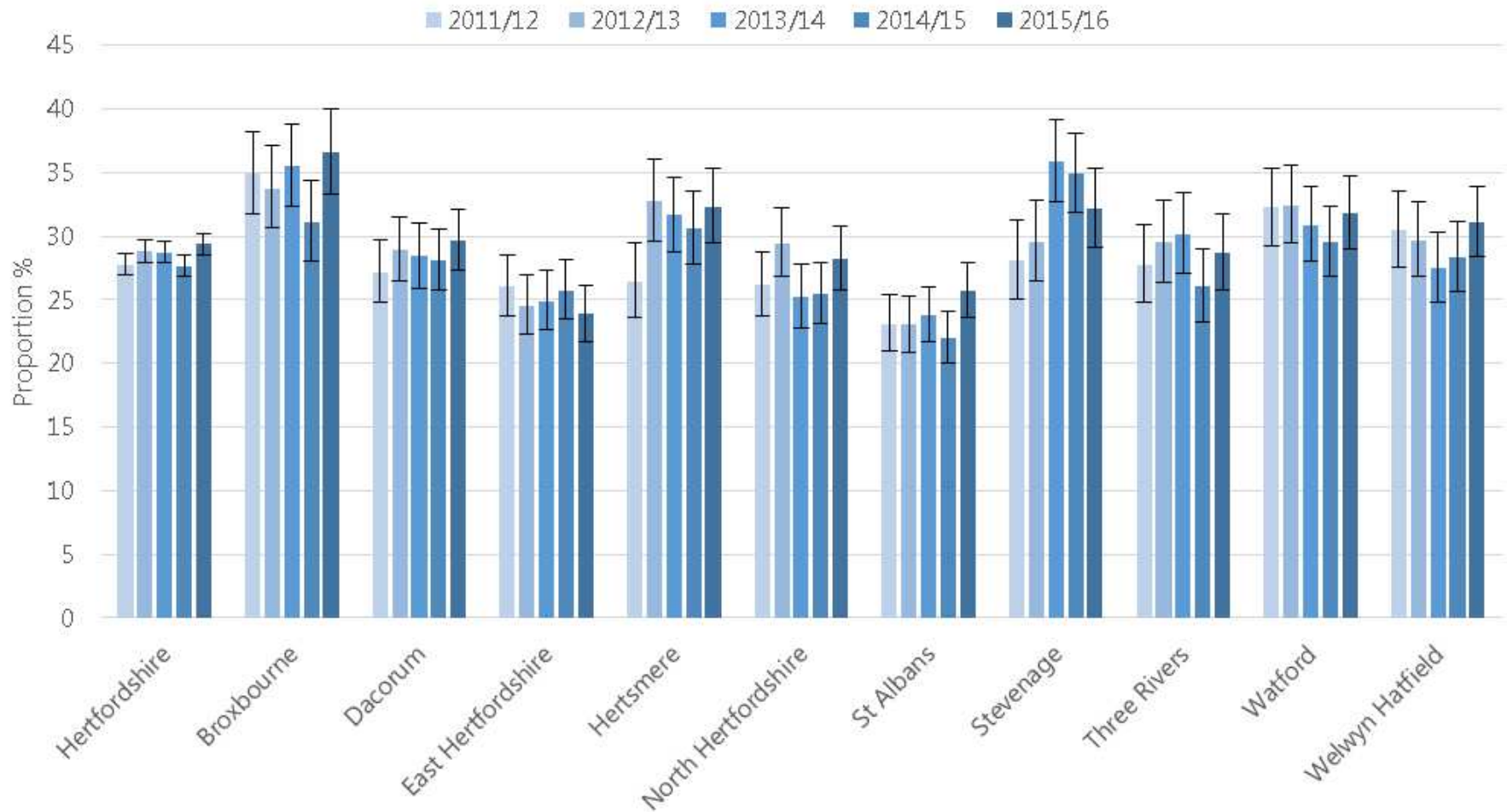

Current approach to promote healthy weight in childhood

- **NCMP** - almost three quarters of parents report an intention to change health-related behaviour after they receive their feedback letters
- **Beezee Families programme** – over half of referrals come from the school nursing service and NCMP
- **Other initiatives:** Daily Mile; Junior Park Runs; Promote Change4life; Healthy Children's Centres programme; Healthy Schools programme; Girls Active; Promote mental health; Child Healthy Weight Network; Teenager insight

On the ground: Service transformation to improve outcomes

Children's Services and Public Health are working to transform and align Children's Centres and PH nursing services to give every child the best possible start in life:

- New service model from October 2018
- Clear prevention and health promotion focus
- Joint priorities and KPIs
- Flexibility to local need
- Continued focus on H&WB Strategy priorities

The new service will focus on the following outcomes:

- Babies, children, young people and their families are at the heart of service delivery
- Evidence-based, best value interventions that deliver sustainable improved outcomes are offered to support families who require additional support to enable their families to thrive
- Service is aligned at the point of delivery to deliver a seamless integrated offer to families
- Information is shared appropriately and timely with professionals to ensure the right support is delivered
- Communication with families is appropriate and timely and in a format that is understood
